Mishpat deals with self-explanatory directives.

Chukat deals with directives that are not self-explanatory.

Chukat are those statutes we obey regardless of whether they make sense.

Too many times, in our Greek mindset, if we don't understand why something is done, we won't do it.

However, we also tell our children many times, just do it because I said so.

This is basically what chukat are: we don't understand why, but God told us to do it.
